
To meet the market demand in Western Australia, over the past month we have acquired graders, water trucks and ten new 20 ton pad foots and smooth drum rollers.

World's shipping fleet to begin massive clean-up

... Did you know?

- 5% of all oil produced is used to power the shipping Industry an estimated 60,000 ships world wide.
- Come January 1st 2020 the world requires the shipping industry to convert to a cleaner fuel or adapt power generation systems and have carbon scrubbers installed.
- In recent times 5% of all oil produced is now being used to power the growing desire of the SUV.
- Worldwide, about 42% of cars sold last year were SUVs, and in Australia we are on trend with 43% of all new vehicle sales being SUV's.
- Many of these SUV's are powered by diesel fuels, the same fuel as the shipping industry is required to convert over to.
- Emissions will continue to rise, if more slowly than today, and won't peak before 2040.
- Planting trees could be the solution- but to make any kind of impact we need to plant the same amount of trees each year to reflect our age - but that is EVERY person on the planet... EVERY YEAR! Something to think about.

With the acquisition of brand new state-ofthe-art spray seal equipment, KEE Surfacing has now deployed one of the most advanced bitumen sprayers ever to enter WA.

Our specially built Jamieson bitumen sprayer has a telescopic SRE spray bar with the ability to spray from one nozzle all the way out to 60 nozzles automatically and the variable spraying system incorporates two rows of nozzles. The truck records every single run on the computer and has the ability to print out spray sheets on the go.

KEE Asphalt has just taken delivery of another 1303/3 Vogele Paver to assist with their growing work load. This now brings our paver fleet to seven frontline pavers in total.

The rapid growth of KEE Surfacing has gone from two asphalt crews to nine across the whole division, and with the continued growth, we have expanded the support system.
